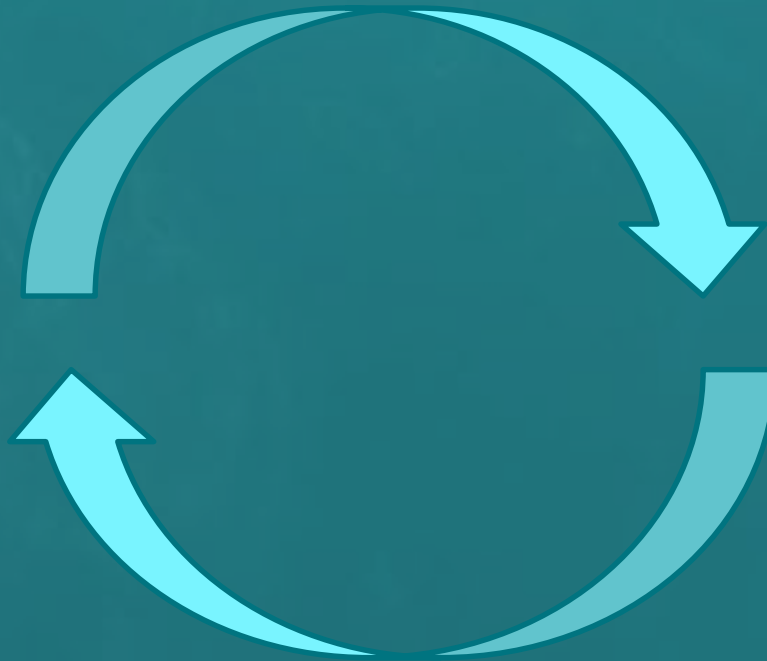

Traditional Codes Cycles

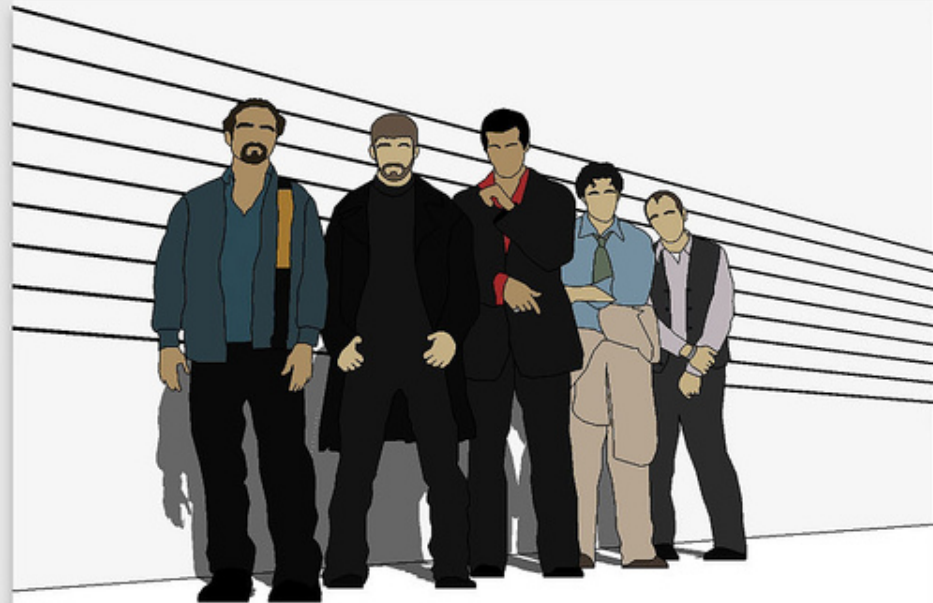
- Every 3-6 years: Updated Code is Adopted at the state level

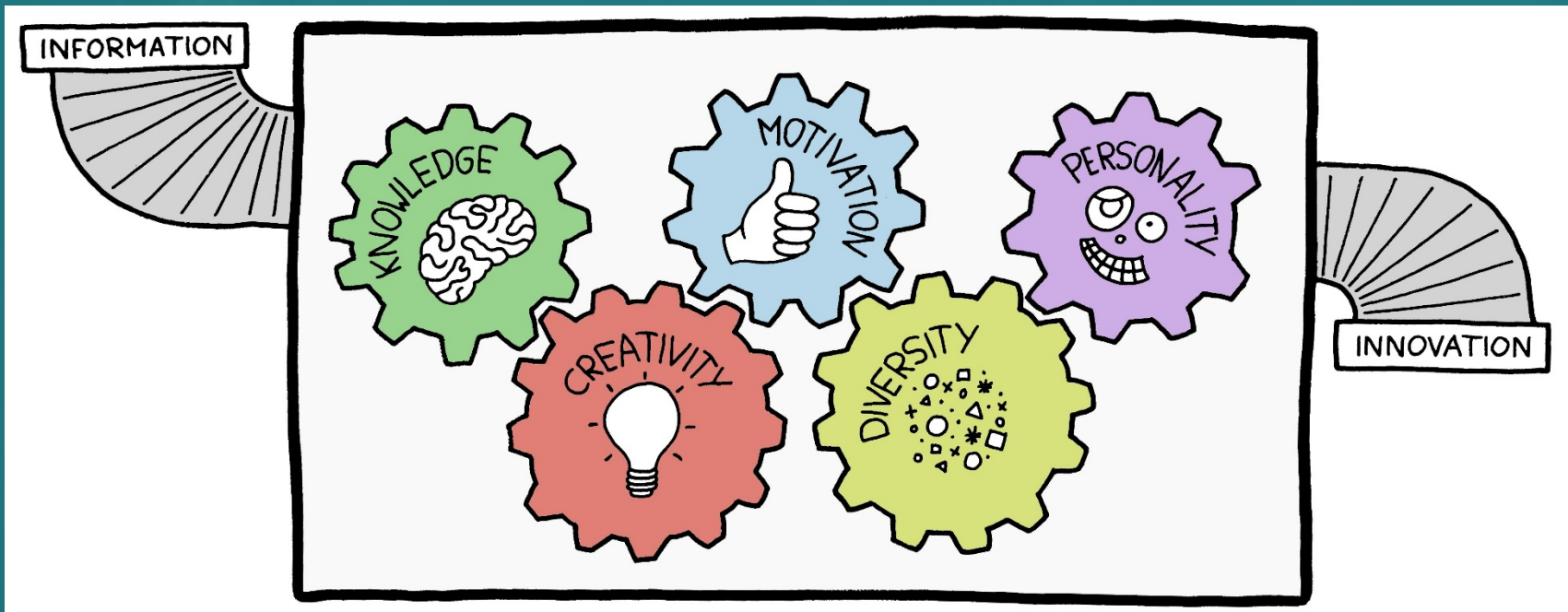
